Part of my work overseeing and leading the Bible correspondence courses offered at Holman prison. I love to see the men getting into the

Word of God and growing in understanding. number of those who are doing Bible studies are in segregation for disciplinary During reasons. isolation the men have time to think and reflect on their lives. This often brings them to a place

where God can speak to them. As I correspond with them, they frequently send notes asking questions about God or sharing a prayer request for themselves or their families. As I work with them and pray for them, I see God working in their lives.

Recently one of the men started asking for prayer about some struggles in his life. At the end of each of his notes he wrote, "Just another LOST soul." As I read his notes, I felt I needed to share that Jesus loved him, that he could be saved, and that through Jesus he could end his notes with "Just another SAVED soul." Since that time he has started his third Bible study course. Please pray that the power of God's Word will transform his heart and the hearts of the others who are taking these studies.

> "Hot rolls, hot rolls!" Raising your hand or even gesturing in any way will result in having a hot roll thrown to you. This is Lambert's Cafe, the home of thrown

> > hot rolls. In addition to throwing rolls, the staff passes around lots of "free" food, free in the sense that you do not order it. It is so easy to eat more than you should.

This reminds me of the tactics of Satan. He throws at us so many things that have such good appeal. Who would not like a hot fresh roll? Will one really hurt? How can anyone resist free food? Most sin has a glamorous appeal, but the appeal is soon gone. The

trap is set, and we find ourselves slaves to sin, helpless and in situations almost unimaginable to a sane mind.

The men I talk to in prison have fallen prey to the "free food and hot rolls" of Satan, and I have too. Many of them never dreamed of being where they are today. Most would pay any price to be delivered from their last "free hot roll."

What are some lessons I have learned from prison ministry? 1) The Word of God is absolutely true. It tells us about sin and its consequences. 2) Satan is a deceiver, and he will destroy. He does not play. 3) I have been incredibly blessed. My Christian heritage is a treasure beyond value. 4) The heart is desperately wicked. Only God can reveal its true character and give the wisdom needed for living a purposeful life.

> "Bill" is an interesting character who has a sense of humor, and when he gets others to laugh, he feels like he has accomplished something. Bill knows what it is to experience

forgiveness of sins but has idol in his life that is keeping him from living the "abundant life."

One day he came to me to

talk. He needed to tell me something, he said, and showed me some scars on his arms from doing drugs. He had enough; he was done, recognizing that the drugs were not accomplishing what he had hoped, providing escape from the pain of his circumstances.

Aware of his drug problem, the DOC sent him to see the prison psychiatrist who suggested he needs to see the mental health unit for treatment. But the problem is not a disease or sickness that can be cured by another drug. It is a sin problem, a problem of worship. Bill's heart had turned to another god to help him escape reality and deal with his pain, and it wasn't working.

As he saw his real need, we prayed that Jesus Christ would be Lord in his life and that he would find purpose and fulfillment even amid the reality of life in prison. I shared with him Ephesians 1:17, "keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know Him better."

Pray that we as chaplains would have a spirit of revelation and wisdom to speak truth to those we are ministering to and that we also could "know Him better."

God delights in doing some amazing things to show He's totally involved in our lives and in control. "Libby" stopped in to tell me she's leaving next week and won't

be there to complete the "40 Days of Purpose" class. She wondered whether there is any place "out there" where she could maybe finish it.

I told her a lot of churches were doing it 5-10 years ago, but I'm not aware of any now. However, a program available currently is the "Celebrate Recovery" program which deals with addictions and which, in her case, could be very helpful.

were. The only one I remembered specifically was in a delightfully unique little don't-blink-your-eyes-or-you'll-miss-it town.

Most of our women come from Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus, Youngstown, Dayton, Toledo—the big cities. Almost apologetically, I told her I'd seen it outside a church in "a little place called Utica."

Looking at me with a totally quizzical expression, I just knew she was going to spit out "WHERE in the WORLD is Utica?" My mind was spinning, straining to think of a

general-location answer that I could give her. My expression must have matched hers when she said, "You kidding?!?...I'm FROM Utica!"

"Chap, could you call the parole board to see if I made parole?"

This is a fairly common request. When an inmate's case goes before the parole board for consideration of supervised release, the anticipation is always a stressful time for him. Emotions run rampant, alternating between confidence and despair.

There is an 800 number I can call to find the outcome. This

small act may seem insignificant, but it can be a means of connection. It is always a joyous moment to hear "Parole Granted." On those occasions I share some parting advice and encouragement. "Parole Denied" dashes hopes, and I can see the man wilt in front of me.

Recently I made the call for a man that I have become close to and heard the dreaded words, "Parole Denied." My heart sank with his. Grieving with him, I was reminded of Paul's words in Romans 12:15, "weep with those that weep." Sharing grief can be a meaningful ministry. I was also challenged as he moved on from his grief and his biggest concern became for his family and how they would respond to the news.

Sometimes we forget the impact these small segments of ministry have on people. Several days later this man thanked me for the time I took to just sit and "weep" with him. And I thank God for that opportunity.

What do fatherhood and sonship, American heritage and history, and Biblical creation have in common? These are all topics I help present to men in prison.

A good father/son relationship is a strong help in life. What stands to be gained is two-fold. First, there is still a chance for restoration of relationships between men and their fathers and their children. Second, there is the forming of father/son type mentoring relationships in the prison. Recently an inmate expressed that he helps "father" other men's sons, young men coming into prison, in hopes that God will send men to help his sons in the free world.

Two classes have viewed David Barton's video series "American Heritage." As men hear the Christian history of the foundation of this United States, some have expressed that this is the best class they have ever taken. They have shared some very profound ideas about the future of our nation in light of a proper understanding of our history.

Biblical creation is perhaps one of the most threatened truths of our day. A Texas professor spoke the following heresy earlier this year, "Do humans have a purpose? Are we special? The answer to that is easy: No." He denied the Biblical account of creation and God's crowning of its goodness with the creation of man in God's own image. This type of heresy is widespread. In the prison, I lead classes teaching Biblical creation so that men will give glory to their Creator and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Classes on these topics are opportunities for men to learn and work together to use and promote God's truth and benefit from His wisdom.
